President's Desk

The members of Alpha Kappa had another very successful year. At the 2010 International Convention held in Austin, Texas this summer, Alpha Kappa was once again the center of attention. For the third time in five years, Alpha Kappa was awarded the title of "House of the Year", which is given to the Chapter with the best property management and maintenance policies. The Chapter also won its seventh consecutive Robert Adger Symthe Award, given to the top 5% of all chapters. Alpha Kappa was also recognized with awards for 100% participation in the $\phi\phi k\alpha$ club, division 1 athletics, a chapter excellence award, scholarship plate (GPA above 3.0), international workday, and 25 man commitment to Pike University events.

Alpha Kappa then returned from the International Convention and started out the semester strong. A huge accomplishment that was completed over the summer was creating a new fully functioning website. The new website is a huge tool for posting upcoming events and news about the active chapter with Alumni and parents. =Also it is a great tool for recruitment, it has all the information needed for parents and a virtual house tour as well. One of the biggest challenges this semester was having Greek Week and Homecoming only a week apart. Our Greek Week float committee dominated on campus thanks to brothers Arthur Hartt (AK '09) and Nicholas Windhorst (AK '09). Then following Greek Week with only a week to prepare, our yard display took 1st place, putting Pikes over the edge in winning Homecoming 2010. With great preparation by our special events chair brother Greg Crannick (AK '07) we were able to once again have a first place victory in both events.

The members of Alpha Kappa continued to challenge themselves in completing over 6,500 hours of community service for the semester. A bulk of these hours were completed

They approached Seltzer, Wright, Taggert, Jones and Morgan and after evaluation were installed as the Alpha Kappa Chapter. Do you suppose they would recognize what Alpha Kappa has become over these many long years? I think they would. They would recognize the quality of men and the commitment the Active Members and Alumni alike show for each other and for the Chapter. They would recognize the values we hold dear, those same values they held. The values that are found in our ritual and the values that continue to guide us, young men and old, as we journey through life as Pikes. They would recognize Brotherhood, and the dogged determination to excel.

We are engineers, for the most part, and like numbers. I am proud of the Active Chapter bringing home the 7th Smythe in a row and the 19th for the Chapter. 
Rush Continues to Prosper at AK


The Alpha Kappa Chapter had the most successful Fall Rush campaign in recorded history with an exceptional group of 29 new members for the fall 2010 pledge class. This was mainly due to the IFC names list, which included all incoming male freshmen, and the new recruitment structure which was redesigned last spring. This structure, led by Director of Recruitment Parth Shah (AK '09), and 4 Rush Chairmen, Brian Van Booven (AK '10), Andrew Terbrock (AK '09), Jon Goecker (AK '09), and Jacob Roth (AK '09); removed the stress that was put on just two members doing the majority of the work.

Last spring the recruitment team worked very hard at all of the PRO days, cold calling, and sorority presentations. This all proved successful with this incoming new member class. In the fall 2010 pledge class, there is one varsity football player, and three legacies. Pi Kappa Alpha came out on top again on campus in terms of pledge class size, by being the largest on campus; this put our house at its capacity of 105 men.

This semester we are focusing on a little bit of a smaller structure led by Curtis McDonald (AK '06) and Brian Van Booven (AK '10). There are also Rush Captains who were chosen by athletics on campus, such as the varsity football team, varsity soccer team, and Ultimate Frisbee Club.

The Rush Committee is also underway led by John Van Gels (AK '08) and Parth Shah (AK '09). This committee will be evaluating the new recruitment structure and continue to make improvements on the life blood of the fraternity. With the rush committee taking action it should continue to build upon he solid foundation that has been established.

In some cases, multiple members of one family have been initiated into Pi Kappa Alpha, whether it be father and son, uncle and nephew, brothers, etc. These relationships are known as Legacies, and at Alpha Kappa we now proudly have 13 Legacy individuals living in house.

Brothers Daming, Graff, Busby, McNamee, Gravlin, Rieger, Kekec, and Meglio, as well as pledges Corey Hale, Van Buren, Hiestand, Meyer, and Baer all have had ties to Pi Kappa Alpha through a family member. Although a majority are a father-son or uncle-nephew relationship, some of these individuals share their Legacy with a grandfather, cousin, or brother. Brother Meglio says, "It's a special bond I can appreciate with my father that not many people get to take part in." Bonds like these truly show the powerful impact Pi Kappa Alpha has on individuals' lives.





Brother Ryan Recovers

Brother Ryan "Tex" Brunkhorst was forced to retreat to a hospital in his home state of Texas in February of 2009 after a blood test showed dangerously high levels of creatnine in his blood. He underwent surgery in April of 2009 in order to have a peritoneal dialysis port placed in his kidney. However, he returned to Rolla in Fall 2009 but could not live in the chapter house for sanitary reasons. In April 2010 Ryan was approved for a kidney transplant by SLU hospital in St. Louis, Missouri, and received a kidney from his father, Bill Brunkhorst, a month later. Ryan currently has had a completely successful post-transplant period for five months and is extremely active on campus. His illness has not deterred him from being Parent and Alumni Liaison, SIT Chair, and Treasurer for STUCO and Treasuer of Students Today Alumni Tomorrow (STAT). He has also been steward and a STUCO representative for Alpha Kappa. "My illness has given me a better sense of how important my time is here, and am no longer willing to take it for granted."

The eight of us have been sharing thoughts and stories about Caleb since that tragic day, and we have decided to share a few thoughts to celebrate Caleb's short but successful life.

Caleb showed a curiosity and passion for the world. He was born and raised in the small town of Jasper in Southwest Missouri, and while he was eager to explore life in other areas of the state and country, he always maintained a respect for his upbringing and showed great care for his family. In fact, when Caleb's younger sister began school at Missouri State in Springfield, he went to great lengths to ensure that her transition to college life was smooth.

Caleb's work ethic was unrivaled. When we spoke with him during his internships at Southwestern Energy, he would describe his 70- to 80-hour work weeks as challenging, but never with a complaint or a hint of disdain. We recalled cleanup of the chapter house when our job was to remove any scuff marks from the walls in the hallways. There were some marks that none of us could remove, and we were convinced they were permanent. Caleb thought otherwise and told us that with a little "elbow grease", the marks could be removed — along with a large amount of paint from the wall. Giving up was simply never an option for Caleb, no matter the circumstances.

We fondly remember the origin of "Shortcut," one

We fondly remember the origin of "Shortcut," one of Caleb's many nicknames. Caleb had a bit of a heavy foot while driving around town and was frequently convinced that he had discovered shortcuts to various places around Rolla. For us, the classic example of this was his shortcut from the chapter house to the Rolla Wal-Mart. Since the half-mile direct route down Bishop Avenue was not

quick enough for Caleb, he tried to convince us that taking his shortcut on side streets would get us to Wal-Mart faster. He may have been correct, but while trying to prove it to us, he was stopped at a railroad crossing for five minutes by a passing train.

Caleb continuously strived to better himself personally and scholastically while remaining genial and caring for the people around him. Like a true gentleman, Caleb always took great care to ensure that guests at the chapter house were relaxed and comfortable. He constantly made certain that his actions reflected positively on both the Fraternity's reputation and his own character. In a fraternity where a large amount of community service work is expected from all of its members, Caleb managed to find a

way to lead nearly all Alpha Kappa members in both the amount and quality of work in the community. After his graduation, Caleb remained active in the community by helping to organize and attend Habitat for Humanity work days with the Pi Kappa Alpha chapter at the University of Central Arkansas.

As Caleb's pledge brothers and some of his closest friends, we have what seems like an endless supply of memories of Caleb. We will remember

Caleb. We will remember him as a hard worker, a great Pike, an elite weightlifter, a questionable driver, and caring friend. We will greatly miss his deep voice, his bear hugs, his stubbornness, his goofy laugh, and his warming smile. We count ourselves blessed to have known Caleb, and we know that because of his contributions, the fire of Pi Kappa Alpha burns a little brighter.



Every April, member's gifts are recognized and new members are inducted. This past April, a record number of new members were inducted, three of



McHenry Tunnel and the










The Chapter House is 10!

Pierre took this position in 2008, after retiring from the US Air Force, as a Colonel, and from the position of Vice-Commander of US Air Forces in Afghanistan.

Pierre — I entered Pi Kappa Alpha — Alpha Kappa chapter as a legacy of four Powell's in front of me. Joe Powell ('52 CE) — 2nd Cousin, Virgil Lee Powell ('57 PE) — Uncle, Alfred Ray Powell ('62 PE) – Father, and Michael Powell ('84 PE) — Cousin. Although I was considering following their legacy with a Petroleum Engineering degree, I secretly harbored a desire to fly military aircraft, and switched my major to Aerospace Engineering while applying for an Air Force ROTC Pilot Scholarship during the first few months of school.

My most vivid memory remains sitting in the basement of the Pentagon, with the Air Force Chief of Staff, watching CNN when the World Trade Center was attacked.

I think I lived 10 years during my 4 years at Rolla. I held multiple positions in the fraternity, including pledge class president and recording secretary, as well as historian and other committee responsibilities. Like all of us, the fraternity encouraged involvement in extracurricular activities and intramurals, beyond just academics. Through my brother's mentorship, I learned the importance of serving others while maintaining personal

balance (mentally, emotionally, spiritually, and physically). I also learned that nothing is impossible if you set your goals forward, draw a plan and persist. Ultimately, the fraternity

propelled me into my Air Force career and prepared me for a adventure filled career.

Leaving Rolla, I attended Euro-NATO Joint Jet Pilot Training and was selected to fly the RF-4C Phantom II aircraft in Germany and then into Desert Storm. It was an amazing time to be in Germany. One day I was flying Reconnaissance missions along the East German border and a few months later I was flying formation with East German MiG-29 fighters (after the reunification of Germany and the fall of the Berlin wall).

During that year, my unit was selected to fly Reconnaissance out of Turkey during Desert Storm. The US Air Force hadn't participated in major military combat for 20 years, and we were all a little nervous. I just remember my WSO (my backseater) yelling "higher, faster, higher, faster." We were fortunate to survive a few close calls and were awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for finding our targets with a degraded aircraft under heavy AAA fire.

Desert Storm success soon led to a national "Peace Dividend" and as many bases were closed, I was farmed out to the California Air National Guard for a year (a unit reknown for flying with Dean Martin Jr.). As that unit transitioned from fighters, I moved to New Mexico to teach Taiwan student fighter fundamentals. In 1995, I prepared to leave the Air Force, and my commander offered me the opportunity to fly an F-15 in Europe. Needless to say, soon I was stationed in England, flying the F-15C all over Europe and North Africa; and committed to a military career.

The highlight of this tour was to host the Battle of Britain Veterans ("the few") in a ceremony honoring their service. As the host, I was invited to participate in the Battle of Britain religious service held at Westminster Abbey, and attend by Prince Charles. A wonderful time surrounded by warriors and heroes that save England from Nazi invasion.

Following England, I attended a year long command course and was sent to the Pentagon. While diligently staffing away, my old office mate from England was sent to Bosnia to sup-

port Kosovo. While protection the Bosnian border, he ended up engaging and shooting down two Serbian MiG-29s, wow! It made me really appreciate my staff job at the Pentagon (not really).

During my Pentagon tour, I was a country director of foreign military sales to Saudi Arabia and then worked as an Aide to the Secretary of the Air Force. One of my more exciting responsibilities was to ensure that all Saudi Air Force software systems purchased from the US were Y2K compliant. The Saudi's didn't want to fly these aircraft during the 2000 new years.

These jobs were exiting and challenging, helping me truly understand the challenges of a large bureaucratic government. My most vivid memory remains sitting in the basement of the Pentagon, with the Air Force Chief of Staff, watching CNN when the World Trade Center was attacked. Terrorists using commercial aircraft as weapons, and I'm sitting in the Pentagon in the world's greatest Air Force thinking and we should be doing something. Needless to say, we were quickly doing something by evacuating the Pentagon a few minutes later. The next day, after whipping the char off my desk, I started staffing away. Didn't want the terrorist to think they had halted the endless iterations of Pentagon staff work...

After the compulsory staff tour, I went back to flying F-15s in Europe. Unfortunately, with age came command and command came responsibility. I became a squadron commander of a unit which supported base operations. This job sent me to Turkey to prepare a base for the Operation Iraqi Freedom. After six weeks of preparations, the Turkish parliament voted not to support the war, and I high tailed it back to England. It was interesting that this time around, the Iraqi Air Force buried its Air Force, rather then engage us.

I was then promoted to Colonel, during my 17th year in the military, and rewarded with a 1 year tour at the John F Kennedy School of Government, Harvard University, to spend a year studying political science and public leadership. This wonderful tour was followed by a trip to Southern Virginia to prepare the Congressional input to the long-range budget for our fighter/bomber forces. Although not something I would have choose to do, I quickly learned that the politics of finance is the ultimate engine for mission capability. Something I appreciate more as a civilian.

From Virginia to Florida, I was responsible for the maintenance and logistics for 54 F-15 fighters, followed by a tour as the Vice-Commander of Air Forces in Afghanistan. I was stationed at Bagram AB, in Northern Afghanistan, surrounded by 16,000 foot mountains and fairly harsh conditions. This tour was a wonderful culmination of my military career. Afghanistan remains a quagmire at many levels, but I truly appreciated the dedication of our and their military forces, and impressive seeing them trying to do everything they could to create peace and stability.

Finally, leaving the military, I find myself in a similar position as many of you. I am still transitioning from service to finding a position with passion and purpose in my new role as a civilian. I will complete an Executive MBA Program at Kellogg at Northwestern University in early December. I am excited about the opportunity to work with my father while using my military talents to create value in the civilian sector.

The road to success requires a lot of what you are learning in the class-rooms but equally what your are learning at PiKA about developing strong core values to guide you in your job, your dreams and with your family, all of which are critical to ultimate success. I've had a wonderful career, so far, and am thankful for the boost from my brothers and the values of PiKA.

Alpha Kappa Receives House of the Year Award

For the third(????) time in XXX years, the Alpha Kappa chapter house was selected as the House of the Year by the international fraternity. In announcing this award the international office of Pi Kappa Alpha wrote, "It still looks like they moved in yesterday. A big reason for this is that the Chapter and House Corporation have a House Operations Manual that provides scheduled guidance on the management of the facility. Other Chapters are utilizing it for their housing program, and it is the benchmark among all Pi Kappa Alpha chapters."



To be considered "the benchmark among all Pi Kappa Alpha chapters" is indeed a high honor. To earn this honor the following criteria were considered. The meeting of operations standards such as market rental rates, written agreements between the Active Chapter and the House Corporation with a flat rate that is not based on the level of occupancy and the requirement that all members live in the house. Other factors include the appearance of both the interior and exterior of house as well as cleanliness of all aspects of the chapter house.

The meeting and exceeding of these criteria is a joint responsibility of all four of the Alpha Kappa entities. The House Corporation (HC) has the primary responsibility for providing a "like new" condition prior to the start of each academic year. (Elsewhere in this issue you can learn what improvements and repairs were completed this summer.) During the course of the year, the Active Chapter's (AC) House Manager and his various committees report any areas needing repairs to the HC director who has the assignment of working with the AC and repair companies to provide a prompt resolution to the problem. The HC also continually communicates with the AC on requests for overall improvements such as the improved video security system installed recently. As landlord, the HC establishes a market based rent which the AC pays prior to the beginning of each semester. This rent is fixed regardless of the level of occupancy. This policy helps ensure that the AC seeks to have a full house each semester. A similar policy

states that no member may live out of the house until he has completed at least eight semesters in the house or is married. The objective of this policy is to provide each member with the utmost opportunities to experience the Brotherhood of Alpha Kappa.

Besides reporting areas in need of repair, the AC is responsible for maintaining the general upkeep and cleanliness throughout the academic year. While this is primarily a pledge and new member activity, all chapter members are expected to assist in this effort. Finally, the AC organizes an annual workday when they undertake major projects with the approval of the HC.

The Educational Foundation (EF) also plays a role by providing financial scholarships some of which are based upon the performance of the house manager and other officers in fulfilling the responsibilities of their roles related to maintaining the house.

Finally, the Alumni Association (AA) is responsible for continually working to bring alumni back to the chapter house through a wide range of activities. Once back, some of the alumni become the source of new leadership in the three alumni entities. This action ensures that Alpha Kappa continues to have alumni with the ability and commitment to continue the policies which have lead to the Alpha Kappa chapter house being an outstanding home for the current members.
