




This year's Greek



These members were able to fill almost 300 volunteer slots for the Pedal The Cause foundation. Pedal The Cause is a bike race with courses ranging from ten to one hundred miles. The riders participating in these rides receive donations that are then put towards non-government funded cancer research. This event draws a crowd of 2,800 riders, and that's not including their friends or families!

Alpha Kappa arrived in St. Louis Friday night in order to get a bright and early start on Saturday morning. On Saturday, we worked tirelessly for twelve hours. We helped set up the event in the morning, and that night we helped with Taste The Cause, a subsidiary of Pedal The Cause where people enjoy food from a plethora of local restaurants. Sunday morning started off early for most of the members that had attended the trip. We worked as course marshals out on the streets, helping the bikers with directions and cheering them on as they raced towards the finish line. After that, we served food and drink to the riders as they finished their ride. Finally, we aided in tearing down the event. After completing every task that had been set before us, our members went home to Rolla to prepare for school the following week.




DAVIS PERRY (AK'16)

ENGINEERS WITHOUT BORDERS PROVES LIFE CHANGING

This past summer, I had the opportunity to travel with Engineers Without Borders to Tarija, Bolivia. Over the course of the fall and spring semesters, I became extremely involved and fell in love with the work my team was doing. From designing a clay blanket to prevent runoff water, from contaminating a water well to writing an operations and maintenance manual for the community's water distribution system, I put in countless hours and learned so much from getting involved with this design team.

On May 17, me and four team members departed for Bolivia. After countless hours in the air, we arrived in Bolivia and got to work. We monitored the existing project (which had taken 8 years to fully complete) and looked for potential problems that the community may experience, such as giving them instructions on chlorinating the system and how to add new house connection lines without contaminating their water supply.

After this, we trekked to a new community, that our team has partnered with, to bring them a water system over the upcoming years. In this new community, we did topographical surveying, evaluated major erosion issues, met the new community members, and interviewed each



of them (in Spanish, of course) about their overall current health and what they want out of our new project.

Being a part of this experience was honestly life changing and really gave me a new perspective on life. I never realized how truly blessed we are in the United States, just by chance of being born here. I am immensely excited to go back next summer and continue to use my engineering skills to help other underprivileged communities.

So, when I'm not studying, setting up an event for IFC, or selling sweatshirts for Pats, it's nice to be able to escape into my own little art world.



Q: What are your plans for this role going forward?


Nelson: "Just keep doing what I've been doing and do the very best for the house—maybe try to even make a career out of it, we'll see."






In early June, I took a solo trip to the country of Morocco (situated in the northwestern-most corner of Africa). I spent the first few days in Marrakech located in southern Morocco, just west of the Atlas Mountains. I stayed in the old part of the city called the Medina. 

This location is one of the largest P&G plants, with over 3 million square feet located right next to the Mississippi River. The plant is responsible for the production of the well-known brands Pampers, Luvs, Bounty, and Charmin.

I interned as a Manufacturing Engineer and was responsible for the completion of five separate projects throughout the summer. My projects were very diverse and allowed me to obtain an understanding of the entire baby care side of the plant including the production lines, the offline filtration systems, and even the finished product handling part of the plant. The work I completed was focused on the improvement of current systems in the plant including utilization of specific materials and improving the dust collection systems on the line.

My favorite project over the summer was working with our German counterparts in Euskirchen to establish a plan to install an entirely new system with the potential to save over \$1 million dollars per year. I really enjoyed my work because there was a direct focus on how each project would directly contribute to the success of the company, which meant I had the chance to complete meaningful work.

Besides the engineering focus of my job, there was a large emphasis on collaborating with other employees, so I was able to meet and discuss my projects with a wide array of full time employees while receiving feedback and guidance to help improve my work throughout the summer. I greatly appreciated the opportunity to work in such a challenging and rewarding position this summer and I look forward to returning back next summer to take a stab at the papermaking side of the plant.

In 2015 he started in a project manager's role. The projects he worked on during this term consisted of the expansion of the convention center at their Yacht and Beach resort, and the preliminary planning of Disney's brand new multi-sport stadium at the Wide World of Sports Complex.

"My first term with Disney was a fantastic experience. I had the pleasure of working on multimillion dollar buildings that had not been released to the public at the time. Learning and working to maintain scope, schedule, and budget was eye opening. The experience gave me an understanding to how and why every dollar of a project is important."

The following spring, brother Jaegers transferred to a new team. This time he experienced a more technical role as he worked as a mechanical design engineer for the park rides.

"I have never learned so much in such a short time while at the ride mechanical team. Ever since I was a kid I dreamed of being part of the design and construction of amusement rides and this internship gave me that exact opportunity. I put my hands on over 20 attractions throughout the four theme parks, but none was more memorable than being part of the opening team for Disney's brand new ride, Frozen Ever After. The project was on a short schedule but we were able to work hard and quick to make opening day a great experience for our guests. My roles included the documentation of the pneumatic safety stop systems, the retrofit and alignment of the station control sensors,



and acting as the project engineer during first shift. Toward the end of the project, ride system testing was taking place throughout the night. During this phase an engineer was still needed to work with contractors during the day. This was a perfect opportunity for me to put my previous project management experience to use while having immense personal responsibility for the construction that was taking place."

Brother Jaegers then returned the following summer to a similar project management role, this time stationed in Disney Animal

"I wanted to use my experience and understanding of the company to further my management skills. I love the technical side of the industry but I also enjoy managing the overall project and making decisions on behalf of the company. This time I was able to work within my favorite park on some of my favorite attractions. My largest project was the upgrade of the Kilimanjaro Safari trucks, where we upgraded an obsolete tracking system and made several other additions to the truck. also lead a park wide effort to update the lighting control system throughout the entire Animal Kingdom. My favorite part of this internship however, was the opportunity to share the experience with Thomas Himmelberg (AK '15), as he had his first internship with Universal Studios in Orlando Florida."

Before his graduation in December, brother Jaegers reflected on his time at Pike and how it helped him have the success he has had. While an active he has served as rush chairman, community, service chairman, sorority relations chairman, Director of Recruitment, External Vice President and Pledae

"I attribute all of my success to my brothers and mentors I've had throughout my time at Pike. Ironically, I didn't want to rush initially, but followed my friends to Pike and learned what a great opportunity I was given. I've always advised younger guys that involvement is the most important opportunity Pike can offer you. The things we do and teach within these walls directly relate to professional and relationship skills you will have for the rest of your life. Pike has a way of giving back more than you expect, as long as you invest zealously. I will forever feel grateful, proud, and blessed to be a Pike."

BILL SCHNELL, P.E.

During the last ten years, 8,752 motorists departed on trips throughout Missouri, but never arrived at their destinations. Unfortunately, they joined more than 36,000 other motorists annually nationwide who ended their journeys, unexpectedly, as tragic roadway fatalities. Bill Schnell, P.E. (BS CE, AK 1982) had an idea to reduce this number.

Bill started working at MoDOT as a summer intern on a survey crew in 1978, and his first supervisor was alumnus Bernie Wagner (AK'46). Over the years, he's played a key role in delivering many major transportation investments in the region. Today, as the Assistant District Engineer in St. Louis, Bill leads the Program Delivery team responsible for planning, design and construction of all MoDOT improvements in the District.

MoDOT has the seventh largest transportation system in the nation, responsible for over 10,000 bridges and 30,000 miles of highways. The St. Louis District encompasses five counties and receives the largest share of MoDOT's annual \$2.1 billion budget. Under his tenure, the St. Louis District delivered the last \$4.11 Billion in projects, 5% under budget and on schedule. He also serves on the Executive Advisory Committee of the East-West Gateway Council of Governments, keeping the top elected officials in the region informed on transportation issues.

Missouri's Blueprint—A Partnership for Zero Deaths is an annual conference which develops the state's strategic safety plan. The first Blueprint meeting occurred after 1,257 roadway fatalities occurred in 2005. With engineering, enforcement and education, fatalities dropped to 757 in 2014, but started rising again in 2015. Distracted driving, smart phone use and unbuckled drivers were a major factor.

Bill proposed a bold engineering strategy, initiating the State's first Design-Build (DB) Safety Project. Utilizing crash data, 31 locations with the highest safety concerns in two counties were identified. Five teams of nationally known traffic/safety consultants and contractors competed in a data-driven analysis and submitted proposals to MoDOT.

The unique DB procurement emphasized implementation of the most cost-effective treatments utilizing Highway Safety Manual analysis. A fixed price (\$24.11 million) variable scope contract encouraged teams to provide the maximum safety benefit with the dollars available.

The safety improvements constructed with this one contract are expected to reduce 73 fatal and serious crashes. This unique project quickly gained national attention.

Bill speaks on the national recognition: "On November 15, 2017, I was humbled to receive an award in Washington, DC on Capitol Hill for the "Road to Saving Lives" Safety Design-Build Project. This innovative data-driven approach was the first in the country and chosen by the United States Department of Transportation, Federal Highway Administration and the National Roadway Safety Foundation as


a National Best Practice. Getting an award on The Hill and receiving recognition from Senator Roy Blunt was quite an honor...but getting to walk through the tunnel system under D.C. to access the United States Capitol was even cooler for a civil engineer!"

Other states are now encouraged to replicate the project to save more lives.

Bill is the father of active Kyle Schnell (AK'15), and brother of Bob Schnell (AK'78).

Distinguished ALPHA RAPPA ALUMNI



DR. ROBERT H. BROCKHAUS (1962)

First, I want to thank the previous distinguished alumni who selected me for this honor. I firmly believe that others are more deserving than me and shared that with the past honorees when they told me that I had been selected. I would like to make my presentation based upon the word "PIKES" using each letter to offer some thoughts that may be of value to today's active chapter brothers.

P is for persistence. Nothing of great value is ever easy — it takes persistence.

During my junior year, I realized that I didn't want a career as an engineer, but that was the only major back then. So I persisted knowing it was a good degree. As a young faculty member, I became convinced that Saint Louis University business students would benefit if a course on entrepreneurship was offered. I was told by senior faculty members that such a course did not belong in a university, and if I persisted, I would not earn tenure. I persisted and did get tenure and today Saint Louis University's entrepreneurship program is ranked 9th in the country among thousands of programs. I am sure that each of you want something that seems difficult to obtain. I firmly believe that if you develop a persistent approach you are very likely to succeed.

I is for innovation. An invention is not an innovation. For an invention to be an innovation, it needs to be desired or appreciated by others.

As a student, I served two semesters as steward and implemented new procedures for purchasing food that saved us money. Other brothers saw that I was capable of finding new ways to save them money and elected me treasurer. As international consultants to families that own large businesses, my wife, Joyce, and I assist them to find unique and innovative solutions to issues that confront their families and businesses. As chapter members what do you think could be done differently? How can you convince others that your idea would be of benefit to the chapter?

K is for knowledge. Without knowledge, you have no basis for your ideas.

My grades were not the best but I did get out in four years with 166 credit hours and having never failed a course. However, my real knowledge came in a different way. As a student, I paid close attention to others in leadership roles, especially brothers who served as chapter president. I observed when they were successful and when they were not. The knowledge that I gained from these observations

has benefited me throughout my career. As an alderman in my city, I studied the pro and cons of issues so that I could make better decisions when I voted. Because other aldermen knew that I carefully studied issues prior to voting, I was influential in helping them decide how to cast their votes. As a student, what interests you and how can you develop a deeper level of knowledge of that subject?

E is for exceeding expectations. It takes persistence, innovative ideas and knowledge to exceed expectations.

Alpha Kappa has a great chapter today, and it also was when I was a senior. At that time, only one chapter in the country received the coveted Smythe Award and we earned it my senior year. Bob Tooke was the captain of the football team and St. Patrick. Bill Hallerberg was the national Pike undergraduate of the year. These two men along with Myron Bruns and I were selected to Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities. I believe that our class exceeded the expectations that the actives had of us when we were Pledges. Professionally, I have always attempted to do the very best I was capable of in any position that I held. As a result, I believe that in most cases I did exceed the expectations of others. Joyce and I own holiday rental properties in the Colorado Rockies, Florida Keys, and the Missouri Ozarks. As owners of these establishments we constantly attempt to have these homes exceed the expectations of our guests.

S is for success. Meaningful success comes with the risk of failure.

When I was a student, success meant graduating. But today, I recognize that I was successful in other ways during those four years that I did not realize at the time. I have tried to give examples in this presentation. I have enjoyed my career and that in itself is being successful as not everyone can say that. Each of you will define success differently. As you strive towards your definition of success, you will encounter failure. Learn from it and do not let it keep you from reaching your goal. I did not and you should not seek to receive honors or recognition for your efforts. Instead just do the very best that you can do and the recognition will most likely follow.

I need to close by sharing the biggest reason for any success that I have had. She is my wife, Dr. Joyce Brockhaus. She has been by my side when times were difficult and has been a partner in any successes that we have had.



JIM MURPHY RECEIVES

im was born in Wisconsin and attended the University of Wisconsin at Stevens Point. He graduated in 1980 with a double major in Economics and Public Administration. He then went on to get a MS in Student Personnel Administration and received that degree in 1983.

He first worked at Creighton University in Omaha, Nebraska, for their Student Affairs department before taking the Director of Residence Life position at UMR in 1988. In this position, he coordinated student activities for University housing.

In February 1999, when the fire at the House occurred, Jim worked closely with officers and advisors to find an initial short term and then longer term housing for the Brothers until the current House was ready for occupation in the Fall of 2001. This was done making sure that enough money was available for the upkeep of the House and not overextending the House Corporation or Chapter.

Jim has served the University for the last five years as Vice Chancellor and Dean of Students. He and his wife Phyllis have 3 kids, Erin 31, Marn 30, and Patrick 26, all of which live in Missouri.

This summer the chapter house received its normal maintenance to assure a "like new" appearance for the beginning of the fall semester. Also as usual, minor improvements were made. Steve Biederman led the work with the assistance of a summer house manager from the chapter.

At the Homecoming meeting, it was approved to enter into a new mortgage agreement, which will save the House Corporation around \$63,000. It will reduce the current mortgage rate from 6.1 percent to 4.1 percent. It was also agreed upon to determine if the new loan agreement would allow the HC to borrow up to an additional one million dollars for major improvements. Jim Murphy, treasurer, has finalized the loan agreement.

It was also decided at the Homecoming meeting to consider the renovation of the TV room and weekend kitchen areas. A committee was formed to consider possible changes with Bob Kallemeier as the chairperson. At the Fall Leadership Retreat, the decision was made to convert the TV room into a chapter meeting room and the weekend kitchen area into a conference room. It was also determined to investigate the possibility of expanding the chapter house with an addition of a social hall for parties on the east side of the Powell Wing. The two changes will allow for Wolf Hall to be a permanent dining room. The resulting chapter house layout will conform more to the layout of the new fraternity houses being built on campus in the last few years. The plan is to finalize a decision by Founders' Day.



2017 Summer Renovations

In May of 2017, the newly elected executive officers convened with the Housing Corporation to determine the plan and budget for the work to be done over the summer as well as elect someone to act as summer house manager. Brother Stephen White (AK '16) was selected as the summer house manager and assembled a team of four additional brothers to act as the summer house crew. The goal of the crew, over the summer months, was to do a deep clean of everything in the house, as well as completing general maintenance tasks and contracting out work for larger projects. The general cleaning consisted of a deep sanitizing of all furniture, walls, and amenities in the house, shampooing carpets, stripping and rewaxing of all tile floors in the house, and scrubbing of the laminate and slate floors with heavy duty cleaning solution. Maintenance of the house included paint touch up throughout the entirety of the house, lawn care,

landscaping, and miscellaneous repair of the household property. Twenty new memory foam mattresses were also purchased from the local Sleep Ezzz store.

The summer also consisted of several larger tasks that had to be contracted out for completion.



King-O-Tile was contracted out to replace the existing carpet in the chapter conference room and both study rooms with a luxurious laminate to match the hallways of the chapter house. IFS was also contracted to perform their regular maintenance on the house's HVAC system. After their investigation of the system, they replaced a faulty condenser motor in one of the A/C units, fixed an exhaust fan on the chapter's dishwasher, and installed temperature regulators in three separate three-room clusters to make the temperature of rooms in the house more equivalent. Jesse Sullins, a local painter, was also contracted to recoat the three community bathroom floors with a precatalized epoxy material that was previously chipping away for the concrete floors. Lastly, a local electrician from Freedom Electric was contracted to remove ambient lighting fixtures from Wolf Hall and the common room and replace them with ceramic plates. Contractors were in the house constantly throughout the summer months, but due to Brother White and his crew working efficiently and diligently, work was never halted and the jobs of the contractors and the house crew never conflicted.
