

# <u>President's Desk</u>

What another great semester to be an Alpha Kappa Pike! Once again, the men in the house spent countless hours working hard to achieve their goals, and once again the excellence has shown through. The semester was momentous in many ways for the Fraternity - beginning in August when Alpha Kappa brought home nine awards from the International Fraternity at The Academy in Memphis, TN, and continued with the transition into the chapter house, and the new 8,000 square foot expansion. The expansion was formally dedicated at the Homecoming Expansion Dedication Ceremony with the Mayor of the City of Rolla William Jenks III, Chancellor John Carney III, Executive Director Justin Buck, and the Powell family, among others, in attendance.

It is an understatement to say that Alpha Kappa stole the show this year at The Academy. It is not possible to describe the feeling you have when everybody in attendance, from hundreds of chapters all across the United States and Canada, know exactly who Alpha Kappa, from the Missouri University of Science & Technology, is. Among the awards brought home were the Chapter's **fourth** consecutive Smythe award, our **second** House of the Year Award in five years, the Community Service Award, the Scholarship Plaque, and the Alumni Relations award. This recognition from the International Fraternity is a sign that the Chapter's hard work and dedication is being recognized at the highest level.

When the members arrived this fall, it was different from the previous experiences. Our house now occupies almost twice as much land, and maneuvering within the parking lot is much easier. Thanks to the hard work and dedication of a group of alumni and the active chapter, the dream of the 100-man house was accomplished in early August just before the semester began. The vision that started years ago was now right in front of us. After a successful move-in (aided by the revised House Operations Manual for the larger house, formulated mostly through the hard work of Joel Schrenk, the House Manager of the summer and fall), the Chapter began familiarizing itself with the new, worldclass facilities that it is so lucky to have. From an operational standpoint, there were a few new things that needed to be done in order to adapt to the larger house and having all of the men under one roof. The new wing was formally dedicated at the Homecoming celebration on October 20th.

The Chapter has excelled in the areas of programming this semester. This fall Alpha Kappa won its **second Greek Week in three years**. This is a testament to the time, energy, and hard work that the entire Chapter puts into accomplishing their goals. Also in the fall, AK placed second in Homecoming, falling just short of a repeat from last year's competition. At this year's homecoming, both Alpha

Kappa's homecoming royalty won first place. Will Kirby, a senior in Civil & Architectural Engineering won the crown, while our queen candidate, Beth Groenke, the Missouri S&T student body president, took the high honor for the women. This marks the third year in a row that AK has won both the king and queen competitions. The Chapter has also been working hard on the

intramural athletic fields. We have a commanding lead of 176.5 points going into the spring semester. This is a larger lead than in any previous year, and should ensure our seventh intramural championship in eight years. Additionally, the Chapter finished the semester with a **house GPA** of **3.11**, the second highest among all fraternities, which is higher than the **all-men's**, **all-fraternity**, **all-Greek**, and **all-student GPAs**.

As I end my tenure at both Alpha Kappa and University of Missouri-Rolla, I can look back at all of the great times I have had over the years with the men in the house. I can also reflect upon all of the great things that we accomplished, and how the journey made myself, and those around me, better men and better equipped to take on the world outside of the PiKA house. The house teaches us the leadership that is needed on the job to excel and standout within the companies we work for after graduation, and to face the challenges head-on. The standard has been set for the future members of the house, and these are lofty goals, but it is understood that we cannot become complacent, but only continue to strive for continuous improvement, because the moment that we stagnate, we fail. If we can continue these practices, then Alpha Kappa will produce men of integrity and leaders in the community for many years to come.

# <u>Ramsay's Corner</u>



Being the Chapter Advisor at AK is easy, except when it's hard. It takes time, and if it's done right, the CA is almost invisible. After all, the Active Chapter belongs to the "boys." They are the ones who make the decisions; they are the ones who create and then meet the budget; they are the ones who develop

the brotherhood into a life-long commitment. Bob Wolf always told me that a good Chapter Advisor is behind the scenes, working to guide and support the "boys." He and I always referred to them as "boys" even though we were aware that they were, and even admired them for being, good and decent men. RV would say to me, "If you have some great idea, never stand up in Chapter and blurt it out." Rather, talk to the SMC about it - if he thinks it's a good idea, then he will take it to the Executive Council. If they think it's a good idea, they will own it and take it to Chapter. By the time the idea is implemented no one will remember whose idea it was to begin with. He said to save what you had to say in Chapter for the things you really want them to hear. The Chapter Advisor should only address the Chapter when it's really really important. If they hear you too often - they will stop listening.

I can recall many years ago when Bob was annoyed at the "boys" because of mid-term grades. They were worse than terrible. He went to the Chapter meeting with a pocket full of quarters. When he stood to address the Chapter, he started with words I will never forget, "I cannot believe that you are as stupid or as lazy as your grades would indicate." Some of you will recall, and you others can imagine the tone of the following "speech from RV." He peppered his speech with a variety of curse words, each one followed by him slamming a quarter down on the table to pay the fine for cussing in chapter. As I sat there and looked around the room at ashen faces, gaping mouths, the look of deer in the headlights, or simple shock, I thought, "This guy really knows what he is doing." Of course, and as always - Bob Wolf knew what he was doing.

I'm not the Chapter Advisor that Bob was. I talk too often in Chapter; I meddle too much in chapter operations; I get onto the boys for

everything from needing a haircut to not studying enough; I occasionally get House Corporation and Educational Foundation Officers torqued at me; and I have a whole host of other transgressions. I do make suggestions the same way that Bob did, i.e., "You know Chaz, you should really think about doing this..." And of course the SMC gets the message and does it. Bob was truly the greatest. But, good, bad, or otherwise, I'm the Chapter Advisor you got. I really do believe in what the Chapter does, and I truly believe in living a life of phi phi kappa alpha, and that if you should do this, everything else will work out. The next Chapter Advisor will be the "guy you got," so be patient with him, as you have with me, and let him become a good advisor. I'm not planning on quitting, but I won't be here for all time to come.

AK has developed a reputation within our national organization. Once in a while, another Chapter Advisor will ask me "How do you do it?", or "How did you get AK to become such a powerhouse?" My answer is not one they are ready for or like. My answer is, "I didn't do it they did it." The boys in the Active Chapter and the alumni alike did it. I just watched as they got sick and tired of being a "good" chapter that never won the Smythe. They then formed a plan, executed the plan, and became a truly excellent organization. I got to watch and take credit for the hard work that a lot of good and decent boys accomplished (and by the way, you are all boys no matter how long it's been since you were part of the Active Chapter).

As you know, I only have one message. Live your lives in phi phi kappa alpha. If you do that, you may not remember who the Junior Founders were, or what year Smythe was forced to retire, or whose Union Army uniform has messages in the breast pocket, or which founders were in the Confederate army, or which one was Union, or who sat out the war in England, or why the "K" is so big, or even what is protected by the Shield. But what you will know is what it means to be a good man. To live a life of integrity, that Brotherhood is life-long, and that love and friendship are based on what the diamond symbolizes. PiKA teaches us how to be good men and to want to become better men – by living in phi phi kappa alpha.

# Victory at Greek Week 2007!

This year, Brian Amsler (AK '05) represented the house as the Greek Week God "Zeus", a highly prestigious honor voted upon by Interfraternity Council, providing the extra motivation to win.

# Homecoming 2007 - Expansion Dedication

This year's Homecoming was a very special time for Alpha Kappa. The Chapter held a ceremony dedicating the newly completed expansion that was added to the existing chapter house. The new expansion was built to hold an additional 40 men, raising total capacity of the chapter house to 104 members.

The ceremony began with President Chaz Blaschke welcoming everyone, followed by Mayor William Jenks III and Chancellor John Carney III saying a few select words. Next, President Blaschke delivered a State of the Chapter speech, highlighting the Chapter's accomplishments. He closed by presenting gifts to key individuals for their roles in the completion of the house expansion. Afterwards, speeches from the International Fraternity, AK Alumni Association, AK Educational Foundation, and AK House Corporation were given. Also during the ceremony, the President of the AK Education Foundation, Keith Wedge, announced the commencement of the AKEF's Capital Campaign, an effort to raise \$1,500,000 to continue the scholarships awarded to members each semester. Additionally, Pierre Powell spoke on behalf of his father, Alfred Powell. To conclude the ceremony, Bob Brockhaus, president of the AK House Corporation, christened the expansion by shattering a bottle of champagne over the cornerstone of the expansion. In the words of Justin Buck, Executive Director of the International Fraternity, "This is an event which makes Pi Kappa Alpha's best house even better... truly one of its Shining Stars."

For a third year in a row, the UMR Homecoming Court was led by Pi Kappa Alpha. # **AK Rides for Multiple Sclerosis**

For the second consecutive year, a group of Alpha Kappa members rode in the Express Scripts Gateway Chapter MS-150. The two-day, 150-mile bike ride benefits the National Multiple Sclerosis Society. The team rose over \$2,000 for the event, which was donated to the MS Society to fund research in an effort to find a cure for the deadly disease. The event took place outside Columbia, MO, where the majority of teams camp in an empty field prior to and between rides. The gates opened at 7:00 a.m. Saturday and Sunday mornings for the more than 3,500 riders to begin their long days. During day one the AK team rode 106 miles, completing the century loop in just over five hours. On the second day, the team rode over 76 miles, thereby cycling over 180 miles in two days. The two day ride exhausted all riders, but Alpha Kappa was glad to ride in the event, as it gave a feeling of achievement while helping find a cure for Multiple Sclerosis.

these conferences, Pikes attend various seminars and meetings that explain the founding of the fraternity, the best methods to rush, the fraternity's current standing against other national fraternities, and methods to increase performance, both on individual and chapter levels. Break-out sessions give leaders of the chapters a chance to converse one-on-one with leaders from other chapters in the region about issues that each of

their chapters face and how to meet these challenges. Another great segment of the weekend is the "Pike University Certified" programs. These sessions are for members who have attended three or more Pike University events to discuss more in-depth chapter programming issues and find solutions to these problems. Alpha Kappa's participation in these events has had a tremendous impact on the Chapter's performance. For the third consecutive year, the conference was held in

Kansas City, MO, a central location for the Heartland and Great Plains regions. Alpha Kappa had 39 men attend the conference, where ideas were generated to increase the Chapter's standing. The Chapter strongly encourages all pledges and executive officers to attend these events in order to instill an understanding and passion in the future. Because of these practices, AK consistently has the highest attendance of all other chapters in the region.

# <u>Rush</u>

"A man will join the best house where he feels he has the most friends." This motto was the driving force behind rush this semester. It was another successful semester of rush for Alpha Kappa, as the chapter heads into the upcoming spring semester with eight new men. This total once again put Pi Kappa Alpha at the top of the leaderboard for campus-wide spring rush.

Due to extensive research by the newly formed rush committee, more effective rush tactics were developed, allowing Alpha Kappa the possibility of signing the "most best" men. Some of these changes involved doing more smaller events, such as individual dinners, where actives and rushees could communicate on a one-to-one basis. Additionally, these small events led to communication between rushees, which begins to form the bonds of friendship and brotherhood even before pledging. 


# Setting the Bar Higher Again

# Brandon Shipman Rides into Alpha Kappa

Brandon Shipman (AK '08) is a newly initiated member of the Alpha Kappa Chapter. Graduating from Eugene High School in Henley, MO with honors in 2007, Brandon has decided to attend Missouri S&T with one career goal: extend his knowledge of ATVs. Brandon is a professional ATV racer.

Brandon's racing career first began at the age of six when he started racing at county fairs to follow in his father's footsteps. By the time Brandon was nine in 1998, he was racing in the Missouri Hare Scramble Series in the 200cc adult class, which races ATVs in a cross-country format. Brandon finished the season in fifth place overall. When Brandon reached twelve years old, he started racing in local motocross races. He then learned to jump and developed a very competitive drive and ambition to compete. Beginning to race all over Missouri, Brandon ended the season in third place in the adult C class. While racing in 2001, Bud Fischer, a custom ATV designer, spotted him and spoke with Brandon's father about building a custom

ATV, and after much discussion, Fischer was commissioned to build the modified ATV to race in the national spotlight for the following year. Brandon placed sixth the next year.

Brandon continued to race in the national spotlight and was very successful until July 2003, when a tragic

accident caused Brandon's career to come to a halt. The accident collapsed both his lungs and fractured three ribs, as well as the fifth vertebra and left shoulder blade. After a speedy recovery, he was racing again in September at the last race of the year and clinched fourth place for the year in the total point standings.

In 2004 Brandon began racing in the youth production class, won two races, and was considered the second fastest youth rider nationally. The next year he

raced Motocross in the highest amateur class. He finished out the year and even though he missed three races, still ended up in the top six places for the season.

The following year Brandon raced in the Pro-Am circuit. Pro-Am is considered the stepping stone between the amateur and professional classes. Placing fourth in Pro-Am, Brandon amazed many people because of his youth and because of his great achievement, was considered and finally sponsored to become a professional ATV racer. This past year in 2007, Brandon set a mark as he became the youngest racer in the Professional class at just 18. At his first event in Arkansas, he finished in ninth place, proving that he belonged in the Pro circuit and eventually finished the season with three top ten finishes and

a rank of 13<sup>th</sup>. His current goal is to finish the 2008 race season with a top five finish. With his drive and passion for racing, and the support of Alpha Kappa, Brandon states, "I see this goal as manageable and would like to thank AK for all the support in my endeavors."



# Alfred & Ursula Powell Contribute \$250,000 New Addition to Be Known as the Al Powell Wing

Brother Alfred R. Powell (AK '62) kicked off the AKEF Capital Campaign last spring with a \$250,000 challenge contribution pledge to the Educational Foundation. To receive the full \$250,000, AKEF needed to raise a matching amount by the end of 2007. AKEF used this unique opportunity to set an even higher goal of a \$1,500,000 endowment fund. This amount will allow the funding of over \$75,000 in scholarships in future years, with surplus earnings being returned to grow the principal to counter long-term inflation.

Al Powell was initiated into Alpha Kappa on April 13<sup>th</sup>, 1958, and graduated from MSM in 1962 with a bachelor's degree in Petroleum Engineering. His first two years after graduation were spent with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, where he achieved the rank of Captain. While stationed in Germany in 1962, he met Ursula Goebel, who was working as a technical translator for Post Engineering. They married in 1964 and have three children.

After discharge from the Army in 1964, Al went to work for Shell Oil Company as a petrophysicist. In 1982 he started Prospect Petroleum with two other partners that eventually merged with Gerber Energy in 1984. In 1990, Al became affiliated with Headington Oil Company, a Dallas-based independent that has grown into a multi-billion dollar company.

In addition to AI, other members of the Powell family have been members of Alpha Kappa. These include: his cousin Joseph R. Powell (AK '51); Al's brother

and nephew, Virgil Lee Powell (AK '55) and Michael Lee Powell (AK '80); and Al and Ursula's son, John Pierre Powell (AK '87). COL Pierre Powell, USAF, represented his father at the formal dedication ceremony held last October during the UMR Homecoming weekend. Pierre pledged an additional contribution for the naming of a study room in the addition.

Other recent major contributors will be featured in future editions of the Kapers.

# AKEF Capital Campaign

#### The Goal...

The Alpha Kappa Educational Foundation has undertaken a goal of raising \$1,500,000 for an endowment fund to support undergraduate scholarships and awards. This will allow the funding of over \$75,000 in scholarships each year, with the surplus earnings used to grow the principal to counterlong-term inflation.

#### The Challenge...

To date, over \$650,000 has been donated or pledged, including the \$250,000 challenge contribution from Alfred Powell (AK '62) and over \$400,000 in gifts and endowments established for Alpha Kappa. To achieve the financial goal, AKEF needs the support of several more major donors, as well as many with smaller contributions. To encourage major donors, the AK House Corporation has authorized the AKEF to offer naming rights to rooms and other parts of the new addition, as well as some in the existing chapter house. Additionally, a Path of Honor is planned around the new pavilion in the rear court yard of the new wing. Engraved bricks will honor those that have contributed \$500 or more. This path will become a permanent reminder of alumni dedication and support to the Alpha Kappa Chapter.

#### The Scholarships...

Last year alone, over \$60,000 in scholarships were awarded to our undergraduate brothers. These awards were not only for academic and athletic success, but for success in meeting chapter leadership goals. The AKEF has developed specific performance criteria for each of the chapter's officers, and each officer's level of success is evaluated against known objectives at the end of each semester. Our undergraduate members have excelled in community service, campus organizations, public and alumni relations, financial responsibility, and support to university events such as St. Pats, Greek Week, and Homecoming.

#### The Results...

The AKEF's scholarship program has greatly contributed to the success of Alpha Kappa Chapter. For the fourth straight semester, Alpha Kappa retained its GPA above the all-men's and all-fraternity averages, receiving a 3.11 for the fall 2007 semester. Alpha Kappa also received recognition from our International Fraternity for having a Chapter GPA over 3.00 during 2006-07 school year. The Chapter received many other awards, including its fourth consecutive Smythe Award, Chapter Excellence Award, and for the second time in five years, was selected as "House of the Year," an award given to the single-best managed chapter house internationally.

# Chapter Success Continues due to Generous Alumni Support

University of Missouri-Rolla has officially become Missouri University of Science & Technology (Missouri S&T). Even though the University has changed its name, the Alpha Kappa Chapter of Pi Kappa Alpha has not changed its mission toward excellence. Accomplishing this mission would not be possible without the continued financial support of Alpha Kappa's generous alumni. On Mom's Day, \$44,950 was awarded to 72 different members of the chapter. A total of \$12,200 was given for academic success, \$6,200 for leadership contributions, \$16,600 for specific alumni awards, and \$9,950 for memorial scholarships.

# Two Golden Alumni to be Recognized with Named Floors in the New Wing


Two 50-year alumni, Richard H. Bauer and David C. Grimm, will be honored for their individual contributions of over \$100,000 to support undergraduate Alpha Kappa Scholarships. Each will have a floor in the new \$2,000,000 chapter house wing named in their honor.

Richard H. Bauer was initiated into Alpha Kappa Chapter on December 2<sup>nd</sup>, 1948. As an undergraduate member, Dick held the positions of SC and SMC. Dick is a well-known MSM alumnus with many years of service on the Miner Alumni Association, including terms as Alumni Association President (1976-1978), St. Louis Section President (1961), Public Resource Ambassador, Chancellor's Leadership Speaker, and Honorary Knight of St. Patrick. He was awarded the Presidential Citation from the University of Missouri for volunteer service in 1984. He is also a member of the UMR Academy of Chemical Engineers and the Order of the Golden Shillelagh. Dick retired as President and Chairman of Missouri Electrochem, Inc. Prior to founding Missouri Electrochem, Dick honed his knowledge of the chemical industry at Olin Industries, Universal Match Corporation, and G.S. Robbins and Company. Dick and his wife Shirley recently increased their funds to the previously established Dick and Shirley Bauer Scholarship to recognize members of Alpha Kappa who are majoring in Chemical or Metallurgical Engineering. In addition to Dick, Shirley's brother, Teddy Wolfarth (AK '48), was also elected Alpha Kappa SMC in 1947.

David C. Grimm was initiated into Alpha Kappa Chapter on March 9th, 1947. As an undergraduate member, he was twice elected SMC and also held the offices of ThC and Pledge Educator. Dave was very active on campus as a member of Blue Key, Theta Tau, the American Society of Metals, and the Interfraternity Council. # Scholarship Program

### Continuation of the Alpha Kappa Scholarship Program

In the Spring and Fall 2007 Kapers, a list of alumni who received scholarships during their tenure as undergraduates from the Alpha Kappa Scholarship Program from inception to 1986 was published. This addition of the Kapers will span from 1987 to 1993. During these years, the scholarship program continued to distribute scholarships to students through the named endowments and honor society initiation fees. Other than expanding the honor societies which qualify for reimbursement, such as Blue Key Honor Society, no additional scholarships were started or expanded from 1987-1993.





# **Brother Jay Verhoff Contributes** as a Pike Abroad

La Libertad, Ecuador - I knew this moment was coming. The travel books I had read after receiving my invitation to Peace Corps Ecuador had all mentioned the popularity of Cuy, but one week after arriving, when a steaming pile of potatoes was put in front of me by my host "Mother" with an entire fried guinea pig spread eagle on top (The head pointed at me seemed to be smiling), I had to pause and ask, "What did I get myself into?" Rewind a little over a year and I was a successful engineer working in operations management at a Chicago area steel manufacturer. I needed a change though, so after a lot of soul searching, I decided to guit and take advantage of my skills and lack of attachments to follow Jared Adams advice, "Carpe Diem", and apply to the United States Peace Corps.

After an intense nine month application process I was offered a position in the Sustainable Agriculture program in the South American country of Ecuador from February 2007 to April 2009. I have to admit that the first thing I did after I read my invitation was to look on a map to see exactly where I 'd be living for the next 27 months. Ecuador is a small country (about the size of Wyoming), located between Columbia and Peru on the northern Pacific coast of South America. The country consists of four distinct geographic zones; Coast, Sierra, Oriente (Amazon Rainforest), and the Galapagos Islands of Charles Darwin fame. Due to its position straddling the Equator and its high Andean mountains, Ecuador has some of the most diverse ecosystems in the world. There are more bird species in tiny Ecuador than in the entire continent of North America. Ecuador has always been the source of all authentic Panama Hats and is the world's leading exporter of bananas. Also, Ecuador is home to some of the finest coffee and cacao growing regions in the world. Unfortunately these resources and the country's petroleum production have traditionally been held in the hands of the privileged few and depending

on the source, between 40-60% of the population is considered below the poverty line.

To help improve the lives of the average Ecuadorian, the Peace Corps has been working in Ecuador since 1962 performing the three objectives assigned to it in the 1961 establishing legislation: 1) To provide technical assistance to countries that request it; 2) To promote better understanding of Americans by the citizens of these countries; 3) To promote better understanding of foreign cultures on the part of Americans. By living in my pueblo, La Libertad, for two years and integrating and interacting with the community, I am for better or worse taking care of goal number two (most people in my site think that all Americans are 6'2" like me, about 8" taller than the tallest guy in town). By writing articles like this and posting weekly in my blog http://jayinecuador. blogspot.com, I'm fulfilling goal number three. For the technical assistance aspect, I am working with the local community bank that was founded with funds from the U.S. Government. I help with computer issues, data processing, and currently am looking for additional funds to expand the amount and number of loans that can be given to local farmers. I also help out with classes at the town's agricultural high school and we are planning on building a Cuyeria or

guinea pig house for teaching the kids small animal production. To fill up the rest of my time, I teach English at the local grade school four days a week and have computer, cooking, etc. classes. Also, I am experimenting with Lithic Mulch practices in my garden to see if crop yields can be improved in our poor soil. I 've had to use the problem solving skills that I learned at Rolla in ways that I never would have imagined, and the experience of moving to Rolla 's small town lifestyle has helped me in my transition here. Although having to live with buying everything at Wal-Mart is a little different than learning to enjoy boiled rodent for breakfast.

The results of my work so far have been minimal, but with Peace Corps having been working

here for 45 years, I didn't expect overnight success. That has to be the most frustrating part of being here. Part of the job is frustration, loneliness, and a nightly helping of boredom. After dark everyone in town is usually home watching bad TV. Since I don't have a TV myself, I spend most nights reading (34 books and counting!). Thanks to the support and encouragement of family and friends, I 've been able to adjust to life so far from home.

What I haven 't been able to adjust to is living at the top of the longest mountain range in the World. La Libertad is located two hours south of Ecuador's capital, Quito, on the Pan-American Highway. The elevation is over 11,200 feet, so breathing even when walking can be difficult. My front door is higher than the peak of Mt. Hood, but because of the intense sun, the climate is like a constant crisp fall day. This climate prohibits the growth of plants that flourish at slightly lower elevations, so the local crops are restricted mostly to potatoes and onions. The view though is amazing. From my backyard I can see around ten peaks that are higher than any in the Continental U.S. I have another 17 months to enjoy that view and see how much help I can provide to the community that has welcomed me so graciously. After my service is over, I plan to head back to the States with a greater understanding of the world outside our borders, the ability to speak fantastic gringo Spanish, and most likely the desire never to see another guinea pig again.

# House of the Year

# 2007 House of the Year Award Recognizes One of Pi Kappa Alpha's Jewels

Alpha Kappa Chapter at the University of Missouri, Rolla was the recipient of the 2007 House of the Year Award at The Academy in summer 2007. The current chapter house in Rolla, Missouri was completed in 2001, following a fire that burned the old house to the ground. An addition to the house was finished this summer.

The tragic fire in 1999 that destroyed Alpha Kappa's old house also took the life of Brother Jared Adams '97. The house corporation then vowed to rebuild one of the safest and most structurally sound fraternity properties in North America. The Pike house, constructed almost entirely of concrete and steel, with metal framing, stands as a fortress in Rolla. It also includes state of the art fire detection and sprinkling systems.

The house in Rolla is English Tudor style, with a front façade that looks nearly identical to their previous structure, preserving the brand of that facility which was well established over its 70-year history. The address remains the same at 613 W. 9th Street, but the building itself is far more grand. The house, including its recent addition, is over 28,000 square feet and can accommodate 104 men.

As you enter the front door to this amazing building, you will immediately notice a tile mosaic of the Fraternity's coat-of-arms, a beautiful piece donated by an alumnus of Alpha Kappa Chapter. Traveling into the formal living room, you will see a fireplace which includes a limestone mantle, maintained and preserved from the previous house. There is also a donated antique grandfather clock built in 1874, when Pi Kappa Alpha was a mere six years old.

The inside of the house includes almost as much common area as it does living space. Between the library, formal room, recreation room, and computer room, brothers always have plenty of space to accommodate guests and host events. The common areas are not the only state of the art amenities; bedrooms include built-in lofts with desks underneath to maximize free space within each living quarter. The addition, which was designed to house upperclassmen, provides a more private living environment with "suite" style bedrooms.

#### Good Management is the Key to Success

Alpha Kappa has its own house management manual. The introduction states that it was created to "ensure that future Brothers of the Alpha Kappa Chapter in Rolla, Missouri would have a beautiful,

comfortable, and safe building to call home."
The information contained within that manual is designed to do exactly that. It is one of the most comprehensive management guides ever seen and serves as a model for all chapters to emulate.

- The chapter leases the house from the house corporation on a flat annual rate, meaning it does not fluctuate with occupancy, and then subleases to the individual tenants.
- One-year written agreements are used, with rent to the house corporation and individual room rents being due twice a year, prior to the start of each semester.
- The chapter charges a market rental rate that is competitive with on-campus residence hall living. In doing so, the chapter and house corporation are able to properly maintain their house and build reserves for the future.
- The chapter also enforces by-laws, policies, and house rules pertaining to the treatment of the facility. There are documented procedures for filling out damage and repair reports.

Alpha Kappa's manual also includes a detailed outline of house corporation operations, chapter management responsibilities, detailed house upkeep procedures, house rules, and all chapter by-laws related to housing. Roles and responsibilities for the chapter house manager, assistant house manager, and kitchen steward are clearly stated in the manual as well.

The chapter house manager is appointed and responsible for supervising the kitchen steward, administering a comprehensive seasonal maintenance program, managing a housing committee, assigning daily and weekly cleaning duties to all members, and conducting periodic room inspections to ensure safe living conditions. There is a strict no-smoking policy enforced and absolutely zero tolerance for destruction of house property, with strict fines in place.

The Chapter and House Corporation are to be commended for their beautiful home and are well deserving of the 2007 Pi Kappa Alpha House of the Year.
